



"What's the name for ...?" -


Reduce ping-pong Teacher-Student response. Increase basketball – idea passed around; bounce off one another.

- "Piggybacking on xyz ideas..."
- "Xyz's comment is now making me think..."
- "If we follow that idea, then..."
- "Building on xyz's comment..."
